Budi Gunadi Sadikin has served as **Indonesia's Minister of Health since December 2020**. He is a **proven public health leader** with experience **steering reform across the decentralised health system of a large and complex middle-income country**, serving more than 280 million people across over 7,000 inhabited islands. Appointed at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, he led one of the world's largest vaccination programmes, which delivered more than 453 million doses nationwide, and transformed the emergency response into a mandate for long-term health-system reform.

For nearly six years, he has led a six-pillar national health transformation combining scientific reasoning, financial discipline, political advocacy, coalition building and delivery at scale, with a **consistent focus on prevention, equitable access, system resilience and sustainable national capacity**.

Internationally, he works across the G20, ASEAN, Gavi, the Stop TB Partnership, TB Vaccine Accelerator Council and the Accra Reset, advancing collective action on **pandemic preparedness, sustainable health financing, local production** and a more **country-led global health architecture**.

What distinguishes Sadikin is not simply the breadth of his experience, but the **consistency of his leadership across sectors**. From physics and technology at IBM Asia-Pacific to leading Bank Mandiri and Indonesia's state-owned mining holding company, serving as Vice Minister of State-Owned Enterprises and driving national health-system transformation, he has repeatedly demonstrated the same **leadership pattern**: setting clear direction, aligning diverse interests, mobilizing resources, driving disciplined execution, and **delivering at scale**.

Key priorities

Healthy long lives begin with strong national health systems. WHO works alongside countries to turn national priorities into results through stronger planning, financing, implementation and accountability.

Support Member States to develop one credible, country-led National Health Plan with measurable outcomes, a costed multi-year implementation plan, mapped resources and financing gaps, and a national coordination platform aligning partners behind it.

Support Member States to mobilize greater domestic financing for health, improve spending efficiency and accountability, and engage Ministries of Finance and Heads of State and Government.

Advance pandemic preparedness and universal health coverage (UHC) by strengthening health systems that deliver equitable access to quality services without financial hardship, prioritize prevention and primary care, respond to chronic diseases, mental health needs, demographic change and climate-related health risks, withstand emergencies and use digital technologies ethically.

Key priorities

Improve access to quality-assured medicines, vaccines, and diagnostics through further utilization of pooled procurement and market shaping.

LEADING INDONESIA THROUGH THE COVID-19 CRISIS

Appointed as Minister of Health in December 2020 at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, Minister Budi took office with an immediate mandate to bring the health crisis under control and accelerate Indonesia's vaccination programme. His response combined vaccine diplomacy and procurement, rapid expansion of vaccination capacity, strengthened surveillance and treatment, and close coordination across government, health workers, communities and international partners.

Under his leadership, Indonesia built one of the world's largest COVID-19 vaccination programmes. By June 2023, the country had administered more than 453 million vaccine doses.

Indonesia secured vaccines through multiple channels, including bilateral procurement and the COVAX Facility, reducing reliance on a single supplier and helping protect a population spread across more than 7,000 inhabited islands.

WHO described Indonesia's vaccination effort as a major undertaking given the country's geography and population scale.

Beyond vaccination, Sadikin expanded genomic surveillance from 16 to 41 laboratories and coordinated a public-private effort that delivered 5,000 tonnes of liquid oxygen to 500 hospitals during the Delta surge.

The pandemic also became a catalyst for longer-term reform. Lessons from COVID-19 helped shape Indonesia's six-pillar Health System Transformation, strengthening primary care, referral services, health resilience, financing, the health workforce and health technology.

FROM CRISIS RESPONSE TO HEALTH SYSTEM TRANSFORMATION

FINANCING HEALTH TRANSFORMATION AT SCALE

Since becoming Indonesia's Minister of Health in 2020, Minister Budi has drawn on his experience across health and finance to make sustainable financing an integral part of the country's health transformation. Working across government and with development partners, he has translated national health priorities into investment needs and mobilised resources to accelerate transformation at scale.

This approach has helped mobilise US\$8.75 billion in external financing, comprising US\$3.75 billion in grants and US\$5 billion from multilateral development banks. Of the MDB financing, US\$4 billion supports a government-led Health Systems Strengthening programme co-financed by the World Bank, ADB, AIIB and IsDB—the World Bank's largest-ever health-sector investment and the largest MDB co-investment in human development. The investment is equipping over 10,000 primary healthcare facilities, 500 public-health laboratories and 600 hospitals with medical equipment, with a particular focus on strengthening cancer, cardiac, stroke and uro-nephrology services.

PUTTING PRIMARY HEALTH CARE AT THE HEART OF HEALTH TRANSFORMATION

Under Minister Budi's leadership, Indonesia has placed primary health care at the centre of its Health Transformation Agenda, shifting the system from treating illness to keeping people healthy. Through Integrated Primary Care (ILP), services are being reorganised around people's needs across the life course, bringing prevention, early detection and essential care closer to communities. This transformation is strengthening a nationwide network of more than 10,000 primary health centres and over 300,000 community health posts, expanding the foundations for more equitable access to quality care.

This preventive approach is now being brought to national scale through Cek Kesehatan Gratis (CKG), Indonesia's free annual health screening programme. Launched in 2025 and delivered through primary health facilities, schools and communities, CKG reached 100 million people within its first 15 months and aims to cover 280 million people by 2029. In 2026, the programme moved beyond screening towards integrated follow-up - including health education, treatment, monitoring and referral - turning primary care into the frontline for preventing and managing disease before complications occur.



LEADING HEALTH RESPONSE IN TIMES OF DISASTER

Leading the health sector in one of the world's most disaster-prone countries, Minister Budi has established two immediate priorities in emergencies: saving lives and restoring critical health services as quickly as possible.

During the 2025 floods and landslides across Aceh, North Sumatra and West Sumatra, 87 hospitals and 867 primary healthcare centres were affected. Through coordinated deployment and rapid restoration efforts, all affected hospitals were brought back into operation within two weeks.

Following the 2026 East Nusa Tenggara earthquake, the Ministry activated Health Emergency Operation Centres, deployed Emergency Medical Teams and mobilised 392 health workers. Within just four days, two field hospitals were built and made operational, restoring emergency, surgical and other essential services while damaged facilities were being repaired. Minister Budi visited affected facilities in Nagekeo and Ruteng to oversee the response directly.

The same model guided the response to the 2022 Cianjur earthquake, when Health Emergency Operation Centres were activated within 12 hours, sustaining services across 22 hospitals, 19 primary healthcare centres and 300 health posts.

ADVANCING THE PANDEMIC FUND THROUGH G20 LEADERSHIP

During Indonesia's 2022 G20 Presidency, Minister Budi led the health track and worked alongside Indonesia's Minister of Finance, Sri Mulyani, to strengthen collaboration between health and finance leaders on pandemic prevention, preparedness and response.

This helped advance the establishment of the Pandemic Fund, launched in Bali with US\$1.4 billion in seed funding committed by 24 donors. The World Bank recognised the Fund as having been developed with the leadership of Indonesia and Italy during their respective G20 Presidencies.

IMPACT SINCE LAUNCH

By February 2026, the Pandemic Fund had built a portfolio of 67 projects across 128 countries, catalysing more than US\$10 billion in additional financing.

During Indonesia's 2023 ASEAN Chairmanship, Sadikin championed One Health as a regional priority, helping translate the lessons of COVID-19 into collective action across human, animal, plant and environmental health.

ASEAN Leaders adopted the ASEAN Leaders' Declaration on One Health Initiative, followed by the ASEAN One Health Network and Joint Plan of Action 2023–2030.

At the inaugural UHC High-Level Forum, Indonesia was featured in a country-reform spotlight as part of the first cohort of UHC Knowledge Hub countries. Sadikin presented UHC not simply as insurance coverage, but as the capacity to deliver timely, quality health services without financial hardship.

Drawing on his experience in both banking and health, he outlined an integrated approach: modernising health legislation, investing in primary and referral care, expanding the health workforce, mobilising sustainable financing and shifting from treatment to prevention through nationwide screening. His leadership demonstrates how financial discipline and system transformation can turn UHC commitments into services that reach people.

SHAPING A MORE EQUITABLE GLOBAL HEALTH ARCHITECTURE

As one of the Co-Chairs of the Accra Reset High-Level Panel, Minister Budi advocates shifting the global health architecture from fragmented, externally driven arrangements towards greater country agency, financing aligned behind national priorities and collective action where countries cannot act alone. Within this agenda, he champions country-led national health plans, sustainable domestic financing, stronger regional capacity and collective financing for global public goods.

For Budi, reform must ultimately translate into stronger national health systems and cooperation that delivers measurable impact on the ground. Indonesia's health transformation provides a practical perspective on how global health reform can move from institutional debate to country-level delivery.

In a conversation at the Boston University School of Public Health, Minister Budi reflected on how Indonesia turned the COVID-19 crisis into a platform for long-term reform—from one of the world’s largest vaccination programmes to a stronger focus on prevention, primary care, digital health and community participation. Professor Sandro Galea, then Dean of the School, observed that Sadikin “speaks like a health thinker” and is “steeped in public health.”

The exchange captures a defining strength of his leadership: combining public-health purpose with systems thinking, financial discipline and operational execution. Sadikin translates complex health challenges into practical reforms that can be delivered at scale across a large, diverse and decentralised country.

FROM AID TO GROWTH: RETHINKING HEALTH FINANCING

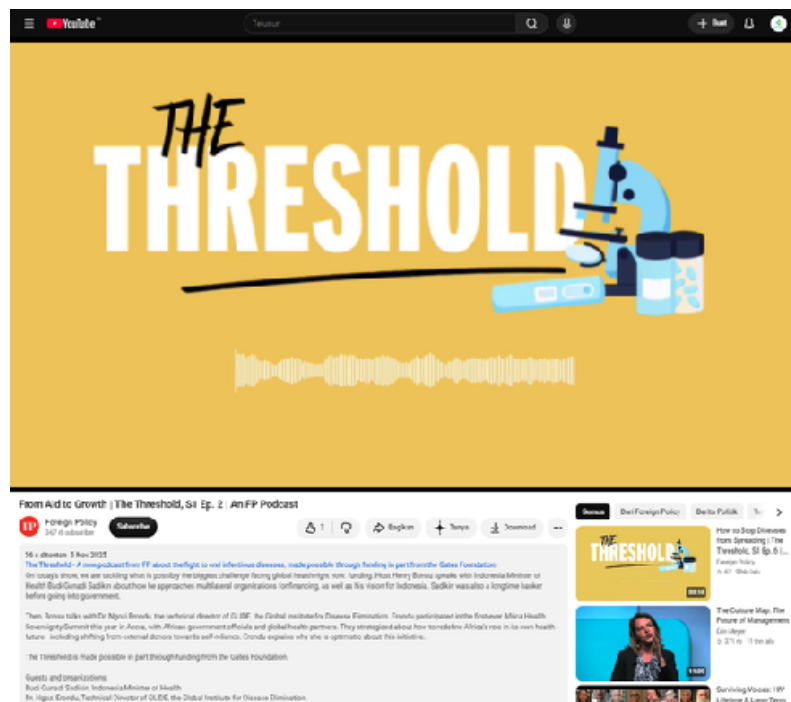
Drawing on his experience in both banking and health, Minister Budi brings a distinctive perspective to the global health financing debate.

At the Gates Foundation's 2025 Goalkeepers event, during a conversation on advancing childhood immunisation and primary health care, Minister Budi reflected on how vaccines shaped his own life. When he was born in 1964, one in seven Indonesian babies did not survive their first birthday. Vaccination gave him the chance to grow up, study physics, build a career and eventually serve as Indonesia's Minister of Health.

He described how Indonesia turned its COVID-19 vaccination response into a platform for longer-term health reform. Since 2022, Indonesia has added HPV, pneumococcal and rotavirus vaccines to its national programme, while strengthening primary care to detect pregnancy risks and chronic diseases earlier.

With infant mortality having fallen by almost 90% since 1964, his message was clear: "almost" is never enough. Every child deserves a healthy start, a strong foundation and a chance to thrive.

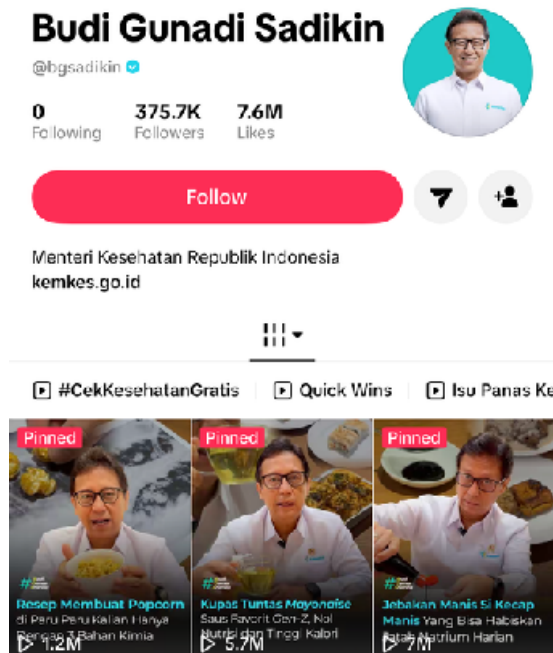
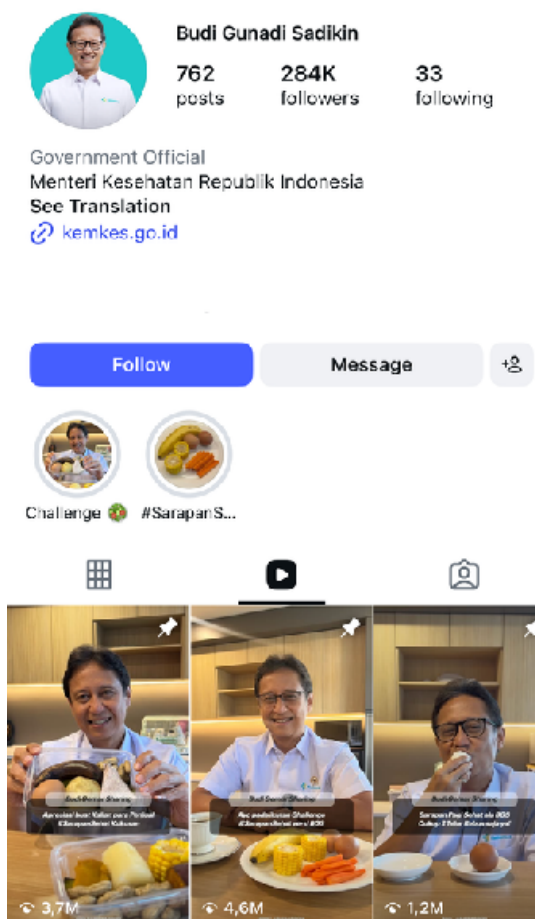
